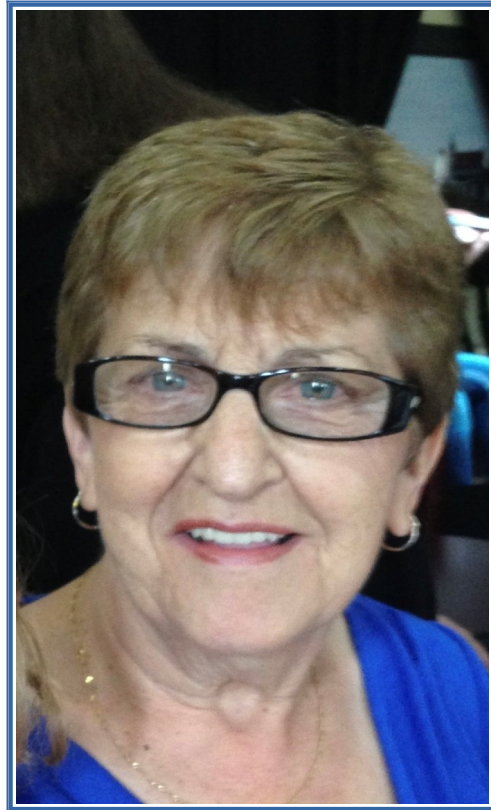


IN LOVING MEMORY OF

It is with deep sadness that we announce the passing of Pauline Campbell, of Judique, Nova Scotia, who passed away peacefully on August 30, 2026 surrounded by the love of her family and community.

Most people walk blindly through life. Pauline danced a square set through life with a smile on her face and a twinkle in her eye. She was one of a kind. You always knew where you stood with Pauline, but she was also warm, generous, and deeply caring. She gave freely of herself and had a wonderful ability to make people feel seen and special.

Pauline was born on August 4, 1947, in Cheticamp, Nova Scotia, to Moise Romard and Rita Aucoin. She grew up in St. Joseph-du-Moine before moving with her family to Toronto at the age of 16.

It was in Toronto that Pauline met the love of her life, Brendan Campbell, at a dance at St. Mary's Hall. They were married in 1968, welcomed their son in 1970, and in 1972 moved with their young family to Judique, a place Pauline proudly called home for more than 50 years. Together, Pauline and Brendan built a life filled with family, friends, faith, food, music, and community.

Pauline took great pride in being a fisherman's wife and fully embraced the way of life. For six memorable years, she even worked alongside Brendan on the water—a testament to her strength, dedication, and love for her family.

Pauline will be deeply missed by her beloved husband of 58 years, Brendan Campbell; her son, Paul Campbell of Ottawa; daughter-in-law, France Roy; and her cherished grandchildren, Liam, Kate, and Elyse, who brought her immense pride and joy.

Pauline was a woman of deep and unwavering faith. For more than 50 years, she was a devoted member of St. Andrew's Parish, serving on parish council multiple times, managing the Church collections for decades, cooking for countless Lenten fish suppers, and serving as a Eucharistic minister for more than 20 years. Pauline had nine Godchildren, embraced the role and loved them all dearly. Her faith was reflected in the way she lived and served others.

Pauline was deeply committed to her community. She served on the Judique Recreation Association and Judique Hall boards and was a proud member of the Judique Seniors Club, serving as president for the past 22 years. She was always ready to organize an event, lend a hand, or simply show up when she was needed.

Pauline's greatest joy was people. She loved a good conversation, whether with lifelong friends or someone she had just met. She loved Celtic music, especially the fiddle, and could rarely resist joining a square set. She embraced life with an energy that seemed to have no end.

Her love of people was perhaps best expressed through her cooking and volunteering. Pauline's biscuits were legendary, her cinnamon rolls treasured, and she likely fed every person in Inverness County at one time or another. She spent countless hours cooking and volunteering with the ladies of Judique and her partner in crime, Danena. Over the years, she also gathered a remarkable group she called her "other grandkids"—young people who worked alongside her, shared her table, and became part of her extended family. She loved them like family.

Pauline was always on the go—enjoying lunch with the French girls, attending a concert, dancing a square set, playing cards with friends, volunteering at an event, or sitting down for a good conversation and a glass of white wine with one of the many friends who regularly dropped by her home. For Pauline, these were the moments that made life special.

She is survived by her siblings Adrian LeBlanc, Gordon Romard (Claudette), Jean Swiderski (Richard), and Jeanine Doyle, her extended family Mary MacMillan, John & Danena MacLellan, Isabele & Doug Gillis, Lester & Betty Campbell, Tina Young, Sam & Nancy Campbell, Shirley & Gus MacDonald along with many nieces, nephews and many dear friends.

Pauline was predeceased by her parents, Moise and Rita Romard and siblings Gerald (Gerry) Romard and Claudette LeBlanc.
